insignificant data on early automobiles one by one. With no chance of personal wealth, he ensured that future historians would have a large quantity of priceless material. The Valentine Award guidelines favor books, magazines or manuscripts with a Southern California slant, but do not preclude significant historical milestones anywhere in the world.



